Use tools in higher end video editing packages to edit films, including precision tools for film-editing such as rolling edits and split edits, and the use of chromakey (green screen) and colourisation of film. Combine images, music, sound effects in more sophisticated ways, including working with multiple 'layers' of film.	Use a range of tools in higher end video editing packages to perfect film edits. Utilise these tools in appropriate and engaging ways to heighten the emotional impact of film.
Sharing	Share films within the classroom, and watch the work of other children.	Share films within the school and seek opinions from teachers and other learners. Feedback / Evaluation	Express a simple opinion about a film.	Watch films from the class, notice obvious improvements and re-film or edit sections if required.
